

Foreword

Providing doctoral training is a huge investment with respect to time and other resources and therefore a formal and detailed procedure for the selection of doctoral candidates is of outmost importance. From a student's perspective, there is a need for transparent and comprehensive information on which potential candidates can rely on, and base their decision on, when taking their next career step.

The 5th UNICA MASTER CLASS focused on the question of how to best prepare a diverse population of candidates for a doctorate. We discussed what could be the success factors for this preparation with



respect to timing and the responsibility of the organisation. The 3 ½ day programme included presentations from keynote speakers who provided insights on current trends in doctoral education and sessions in small working groups that provided an opportunity to discuss, share experiences, understand how others operate and to reflect on these approaches. As a result, participants had an opportunity to get equipped with information to better understand their own situations and develop new strategies.

1. What are the main challenges of transition of doctoral students from Master to PhD level?

- ✓ Attracting and recruiting candidates: competing with other HEIs and/or the labour market;
- ✓ Transparent and fair selection: collegial vs. individual;
- ✓ Candidate-Supervisor matching;
- ✓ Lack of skills and competences: research techniques, methods, academic writing... different standards (internationally and discipline wise;
- ✓ Lack of awareness and unclear expectations (careers?) and motivations;
- \checkmark Diversity of the candidates' population.

2. How do you deal with those challenges at the individual and institutional level?

- ✓ Recruiting candidates already at the Master level, talent spotting,
- ✓ Doctoral schools in charge of advertising and recruitment, training supervisors, rewarding supervision,
- ✓ Providing information through seminars, workshops etc. for both candidates and faculty,
- ✓ Individual coaching of potential starters,
- ✓ Starting with career planning at the very beginning,
- ✓ Integrating PhD candidates early into research groups,
- ✓ Raising awareness about the PhD through e.g. quizes, matching PhDs and Master students.

3. What are your motivations and expectations regarding the 5th UNICA PhD MASTER CLASS?

- ✓ Exchange ideas, network and discuss with European peers,
- ✓ Learn about best practice examples,
- ✓ Get new insights from experts,
- ✓ Discuss and reflect with other participants on different approaches and strategies,
- ✓ Identify transferable approaches,
- ✓ Gain fresh energy before the start of the new academic year
- ✓ Shared sense of enthusiasm and humour and Buza Buza at night!



Experts & Organisers

Alexandra Bitusikova, Matej Bel University

Alexandra Bitusikova received her PhD in social anthropology from Comenius University in Bratislava, Slovakia. Most of her professional career she has been working at the Research Institute of Matej Bel University in Banska Bystrica, Slovakia, first as a research fellow, then in



1993-2000 as Director of the Research Institute, and in 2010-2012 as Vice-Rector for Research. She was a visiting scholar at Cambridge University, UK; University College London, UK; and Boston University, US (Fulbright). She is author of a number of publications on urban anthropology, gender, post-socialist social and cultural change in Central Europe, and reform of doctoral education in Europe. In 2001 she was seconded to the European Commission, DG Research in Brussels. Since 2003 she has been working at the European University Association (EUA) in Brussels, being responsible for all activities related to doctoral education reform in Europe, and was fully engaged in the process of establishment of the EUA Council for Doctoral Education in 2008. Since then she has been working at EUA as an external adviser in the field of doctoral education, and working as a full-time researcher at Matej Bel University in Slovakia.

Kris Dejonckheere, UNICA

Kris is Secretary General of UNICA and heads the UNICA Secretariat in Brussels since 2001. In her capacity as Secretary General, Kris represents UNICA at the senior level in contacts with European Union institutions, HE organisations, networks and nongovernmental organisations from and outside Europe, and other key stakeholders. Kris has coordinated several EU-funded projects, including the HE Reform Service Contract with the



European Commission (2007-2013), and two TEMPUS projects: UZDOC: Enhancing quality of doctoral education at HEIs in Uzbekistan and RUMI: Network of Moroccan Universities for Inclusive Education (both ongoing). Kris holds degrees in Law and Ethics. In 1994, she was appointed Political Advisor for University matters to the Flemish Minister for Education. Kris also held different positions at the Vrije Universiteit Brussel and for many years she was responsible for Research, International Relations & Interface with Industry Department.

Andreas Frijdal, European University Institute

Dr. Andreas Frijdal studied chemistry and economics at the Vrije Universiteit Brussel and also obtained his Ph.D. in Economics there. He has worked in the Economics Department of the Vrije Universiteit Brussel at the Centre for Financial Economics. He later set up the University's R&D sector and focused on specialising in research management.



In 1985 he moved to the European University Institute, Florence (Italy), where he was responsible for research management before becoming Head of the Academic Service. While there, he published various reports on research management, doctoral education and the development of European Studies programs for the European Union and other governmental bodies. Over the last ten years he has focused on the training of researchers in his function as Head of Academic Service, responsible for the implementation of doctoral and postdoctoral programmes.

Slaven Mihaljević, University of Zagreb

Slaven Mihaljević is Head of the Office of Doctoral Programmes and has been working in the field of doctoral education since 2008. He is in charge of quality assurance in doctoral education at the University of



Zagreb, and is involved in the coordination of universities' efforts to modernize its organization of doctoral education. He holds a Master of Science degree in comparative literature, and is currently enrolled in a doctoral programme at the University of Zagreb. His doctoral thesis is about the reform of doctoral education in European universities.

Melita Kovačević, University of Zagreb

Melita Kovačević is Chair of the EUA-CDE Steering Committee. Melita Kovačević was a member of different national and European bodies related to higher education. She has been frequently invited to give talks on different topics related to HE reforms home and abroad. Within the



UNICA Network Melita Kovačević is in particular active in the area of doctoral education and research and contributes largely to the debate on doctoral education in Europe and beyond. Melita Kovačević is also a member of the UNICA Steering Committee. Melita Kovačević served as Vice-Rector for Research and Technology at the University of Zagreb from 2006 until October 2014 and she is Full Professor at the Department of Speech and Language Pathology. She is Head of the Laboratory for Psycholinguistic Research and Director of the Interdisciplinary Doctoral Programme Language and Cognitive Neuroscience. Melita Kovačević held research and visiting positions at different European and American universities and is a member of various national and international societies.

Vaughan Robinson, King's College London

Vaughan Robinson has been Professor and Director of the Graduate School at King's College London since 2006. As such, he has overall responsibility for the recruitment and student experience of doctoral researchers across all disciplines and for the quality standards of their



education. Prior to that, he held positions of Professor of Human Geography and Sub-Dean Graduate School at Swansea University, as well as Prize Research Fellow at Oxford University. He holds a PhD in Geography from Oxford University.

Hans Sonneveld, Director of the Netherlands Centre for Research and Graduate Schools

Hans Sonneveld is Director of the Netherlands Centre for Research and Graduate Schools. Prior to that, he was Managing Director of the Amsterdam School for Social Science Research, one of the first Dutch graduate schools. Hans Sonneveld is a sociologist by training. He has



conducted a number of investigations in the field of doctoral education over the last decades. His publications in this area include the book "PhD supervisors, PhD students and the Academic Selection" and articles like "What took them so long? Explaining PhD Delays among Doctoral Candidates" (PLoS ONE) and "Gender inequality in the Dutch doctoral system" (Journal for Gender Studies). He is advising and training starting and experienced PhD supervisors and is teaching programmes for PhD candidates. Currently, he is working on a manual for directors of graduate schools (co-author Andreas Frijdal), a guide for supervisors in the field of engineering and a publication about the topic exploration stage in a PhD project. In 2014, he was Chair of the Dutch National Supervisor Award Committee.

Luciano Saso, Sapienza University of Rome

Luciano Saso (Faculty of Pharmacy and Medicine, Sapienza University of Rome, Italy) received his Doctorate in Pharmaceutical Sciences from Sapienza University in 1992. He is author of more than 120 scientific articles published in peer reviewed international journals with impact factor. During his career, he supervised several doctoral candidates from different countries including Italy, Spain, France, Germany, Bulgaria, Czech Republic, Iran, Estonia, India and Russia, getting to know well a variety of doctoral education systems. He has extensive



experience in international relations and he is currently Vice-Rector for European University Networks of Sapienza University of Rome and Member of the UNICA Steering Committee.

Lucas Zinner, University of Vienna


Lucas Zinner began his career as a researcher in Mathematics at the University of Vienna, Mid Sweden University and the Technical University of Vienna. He expanded his expertise and gained profound knowledge in research evaluation processes when he joined at the Austrian Science Foundation (FWF) as Scientific Administrator. Lucas Zinner became Vice-Director of the Research Services and International



Relations Office, helped organize a Research Services Office including Technology. Furthermore he became responsible for "Initiativkollegs", an internal funding scheme to promote structured doctoral programs at the University of Vienna. Since 2008 he is leading a project established by the University's Rectorate focusing on the change of doctoral education and the development of inherent supporting structures. Lucas Zinner is active member of UNICA and specially committed to the PhD working group.
