Results of the ACP projects coordinated by U.Porto:

525 scholarship holders

(575 but 50 drop-out)

354 scholarship holders from Africa (> 67%)

(386 but 32 drop-out)

- SOOD CONTACT PERSON (THE FACE OF THE INSTITUTION IN ALL CONSORTIUM ACTIVITIES)
- ➤ ENGAGE ASSOCIATE PARTNERS IN ALL STAGES OF THE PROJECT'S IMPLEMENTATION

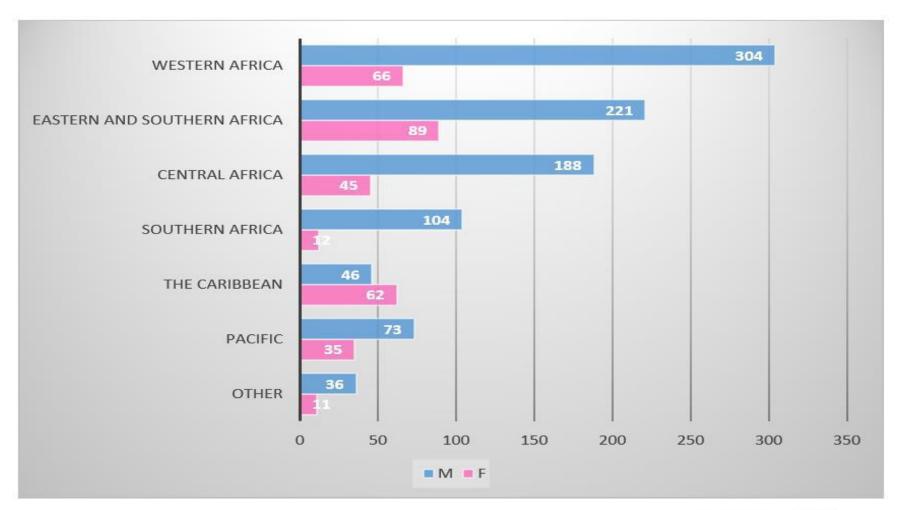
STRONG COMMUNICATION STRATEGY

MANAGEMENT VISA ISSUE

- > DISTANT CONSULATES AND EMBASSIES (EXTRA-TRAVELLING)
- > MANDATORY PRESENCE

> DIFFERENT CONSULATES DEMAND DIFFERENT DOCUMENTS

➤ BIOMETRICS — NOT ALL CONSULATES ARE PREPARED

> SOMALI PASSPORTS NOT ACCEPTED IN EUROPE





MANAGEMENT VISA ISSUE

- > INVITATION LETTERS: COORDINATOR AND HOME INSTITUTIONS
- > RECCOMMENDATION LETTER: HOME INSTITUTION
- LIST OF SELECTED APPLICANTS SENT TO EMBASSIES AND CONSULATES
- > Involve EU Delegations in the visa process
- CLOSE CONTACT WITH AUTHORITIES TO MONITOR THE VISA ISSUE

MANAGEMENT ACCOMMODATION

EU COMMON PROCEDURES ARE NOT SUITABLE TO EMA2 STUDENTS

AS A RESPONSE, THE CONSORTIUM CREATED NEW MANDATORY PROCEDURES TO PROTECT THE SCHOLARSHIP HOLDERS:

- ➢ IT IS A RESPONSIBILITY OF THE HOST INSTITUTION TO ARRANGE A SUITABLE ACCOMMODATION
- SCHOLARSHIP HOLDERS MUST KNOW WHERE THEY ARE STAYING BEFORE THEY LEAVE THEIR HOME COUNTRY





MANAGEMENT LANGUAGE

LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS, AN OBSTACLE?

➤ Difficulty in obtaining TOEFL or IELTS tests

> Tests are too expensive

➤ EN as mother tongue (national language) is not enough?





MANAGEMENT LANGUAGE

- > critical aspect to enhance international mobility
 - > Pre-departure language training

≻Online language courses

UPorto's example: course contents to support an online platform for language training, to be able to attract more students from non-PT speaking countries





MANAGEMENT LANGUAGE

- Language courses upon arrival (are they sufficient?)
- Tutorial support (bibliography and written tests provided in EN)

EMPLOYABILITY

VERY MUCH LINKED WITH BRAIN-DRAIN

How to motivate a top-level student to return to the home country with no employment prospects?





EMPLOYABILITY

DENTIFY THE NEEDS OF THE LABOUR MARKET

Establish a link between the consortium and the economic and business sectors in the home countries

partners, associates and local authorities



EMPLOYABILITY

DENTIFY THE NEEDS OF THE LABOUR MARKET

- ➤ Identify the work opportunities at the home country
- > Select applicants in the priority areas
- Establish a set of contacts with companies and enterprises in the home countries to grant work placements or job experiences

➤ sustaining the impact of EMA2 projects beyond the EU support



UNDERSTAND WHAT SUSTAINABILITY MEANS

Our definition of sustainability also focuses on aspects linked with partnership integration, cooperation, quality, innovation, visibility and employability.

AlM: generate a strong and tangible impact that may lead to multiplying effects in the future.



ENABLE INTEGRATED CONSORTIUM INITIATIVES TOWARDS SUSTAINABILITY

One project cannot aim at attaining a strong and global impact

The project must be focused on effective small steps that together may generate a significant change



ENABLE INTEGRATED CONSORTIUM INITIATIVES TOWARDS SUSTAINABILITY

- Signature of MOUs
- > Co-tutelle agreements
- Double diploma at master level
- ➤ Joint supervision of thesis (master and PhD) and joint diplomas





ENABLE INTEGRATED CONSORTIUM INITIATIVES TOWARDS SUSTAINABILITY

- Encouraging staff mobility (U.Porto's example for staff mobility funding)
- Motivating researchers' mobility (available resources at department level?)
- > Support to student mobility (fee waiver policy)



- OTHER OPPORTUNITIES FOR COOPERATION

IDENTIFY ALTERNATIVE FINANCIAL RESOURCES

- ➤ local and national funding opportunities (Scholarship Institute from Mozambique)
- > synergies with existing Programmes also devoted to HE (IFC African, Network of Public Universities of CPLP...)
