- WSES linked to WSEN
- WSEN (World Student Environmental Network) established in 2008 as a joint decision of students around the world during the first WSES held at Doshisha University in Kyoto.
- Mission: worldwide paradigm shift towards a more sustainable society through activities on university campuses



- Cooperate towards a sustainable society
- Create global solutions to climate change
- Be a hub for student actions within Universities and local communities
- Need for a global network of students
- Share information, ideas and best practices




- UNIL's profile based on 3 axes:

- Agenda 21 (1.0 and 2.0)
- Sustainability as part of the UNIL's intention plan
 - Sustainable development at the centre of UNIL's concerns



- Campus plus label, attitude and website
- UNIL as member of UGAF WG



All these points enhance the visibility of UNIL




Emphasise UNIL's efforts beyond research and teaching

- A student meets a students meets a student...
- Participation in past WSES
- Students meet with the UNIL board and the IR Office
- Budget established and accepted by UNIL board
- WSEN elects UNIL for WSES 2012



- September 2011: first steps to set up a WSES 2012 organising committee
- Students of Geosciences & Environmental Faculty
- Think about program (speakers, themes, workshops etc.) and side program
- Selection of delegates (which Universities?) –
 CV, questionnaire and motivation letter, gender balance
- End of June 2012 final selection



- Selection of helpers
- Logistics: accommodation, meals, venue, flights, visa issues etc.
- Strong support from IR Office since the first meeting and other services
- Final budget: CHF 100'000.-
 - CHF 70'000 UNIL
 - CHF 30'000 Travel fund (City of Lausanne, Doshisha U and Faculty)

- WSES 2012 held last September
- Theme: « Let's change! » without radical change of our behaviours, environment will undergo irreversible damage
- Addressed on 3 levels (individual, societal, international) each day a different level
- Conferences, debates, skype discussions, workshops, presentation of University projects

- Opening & Closing Ceremony
- Pre-summit movie
- Many debates and conferences filmed
- About 70 delegates from all over the world
- About 20 helpers



 Argentina, Australia, Belgium, Bolivia, Canada, Chile, China, Czech Republic, Estonia, France, Germany, India, Indonesia, Israel, Japan, Morocco, Mexico, New Zealand, Nigeria, Norway, Portugal, Russia, Slovakia, South Africa, Sweden, Switzerland, United Arab Emirates, USA, Vietnam

- Final outcome report, submitted to a member of the federal parliament, vice president of the Swiss green party
- University statement, to be adapted by the delegates and presented to the respective rectors

- Final outcome report will be given to UNIL rector, mainstreaming through CRUS intended
- Speakers will receive the documents
- Intention to give the report to local and cantonal authorities
- Follow-up article in UNIL magazine
- Future Campus Project



- Questionnaire filled in by delegates (feedback)
- Visibility through videos posted on youtube
- Article in newspaper; local radio station
- Outcome for students:
 - Good for organising UNIL students (management skills, team work, work experience) and delegates (networking, exchange of best practices, ideas and projects, visit of Switzerland)
 - Rather weak for UNIL student community (only few debates open to public, little advertising)



- Some challenges:
 - Setting up the committee
 - Define tasks
 - Lenght of preparation
 - Intercultural issues
 - And of course logistics!
