#### Phase 1 - December 2017

- Citizen's rights
- Irish border
- Financial settlement

Full UK participation in Erasmus+ and Horizon 2020 until end of programmes

#### **NEGOTIATIONS THUS FAR**

#### **Transition deal – March 2018**

- 29 March 2019 to 31 December 2020
- All EU rules and regulations continue to apply
- EU citizens arriving before 31 December 2020 will enjoy the same rights and guarantees
- The UK will be able to negotiate, sign and ratify its own trade deals during the transition period
- The UK will still be party to existing EU trade deals with other countries
- Northern Ireland will effectively stay in parts of the single market and the customs union in the absence of other solutions to avoid a hard border with the Republic of Ireland

Nothing is agreed until everything is agreed



# EUROPEAN COUNCIL'S GUIDELINES FOR TRADE AND FUTURE RELATIONSHIP

#### **Economic relationship:**

- Free Trade Agreement with EU
- When UK is no longer a Member State

#### **Migration:**


- Ambitious provisions on movement of natural persons

#### **Socio-Economic cooperation – HE&R programmes:**

 Any participation of the UK should be subject to the relevant conditions for the participation of third countries

#### **CHALLENGES**

Without the government taking action, there are risks that:

- the UK higher education sector's reputation as a collaborator of choice in vital research is weakened
- access to key funding mechanisms to support research excellence are lost
- the UK will slip further behind competitors in sending students abroad as part of their degree
- the UK will lose existing academic talent from the EU
- universities will experience sudden, steep declines in EU student enrolments
- · universities' activity to drive local growth and generate jobs will be hampered

Figure 13: Academic staff nationalities, 2005-06 and 2015-16




Figure 14: Proportion of staff who are international by academic function, 2015–16




Figure 3: Number of EU and non-EU students in the UK, 2007-08 to 2015-16




