## Welcome to Zagreb

Zagreb is the capital of the Republic of Croatia, located at the crossroads of Central and Southeast Europe. With almost one million inhabitants, it is the political, economic, cultural, and academic centre of the country.

The city combines Central European elegance with a Mediterranean spirit. Its historic Upper Town (Gornji grad), with medieval streets and buildings, offers a glimpse of the city's origins, while the Lower Town (Donji grad) features 19th-century architecture, parks, and vibrant squares. Zagreb is also well known for its numerous museums, theatres, and galleries.

## Transport and Accessibility

Zagreb Franjo Tuđman International Airport (ZAG) is located about 15 km from the city centre. Regular shuttle buses, taxis, and ride-sharing services connect the airport with the city. Public transportation in Zagreb consists mainly of trams and buses, which are convenient for reaching most parts of the city. Taxi services are available throughout the city and can be paid for in cash or by card.

## Public Transportation


Public transportation in Zagreb includes trams, buses, and a suburban railway system. They run frequently during the day and less often at night. Tickets for trams and buses can be purchased directly on board, at kiosks, or via the official ZET mobile application by scanning a QR code. ## University of Zagreb



### About the University

The University of Zagreb, founded in 1669, is the oldest and largest university in South-Eastern Europe. As a comprehensive public Central European university, it offers education and research in all scientific fields (arts, biomedicine, biotechnology, engineering, humanities, natural sciences, and social sciences), covering all study levels from undergraduate to postgraduate. With 29 Faculties, 3 Art Academies, and the University Centre for Croatian Studies, it is the flagship educational institution in Croatia, where more than 7,900 teachers and 72,480 students develop knowledge and acquire skills.

The University excels not only in teaching but also in research, contributing over 50 percent of Croatia's annual research output and 80 percent of the scientific productivity of all Croatian universities. Its central strategic goal for future development is to strengthen its role as a research-oriented institution with high-quality teaching.

### Arriving at the University of Zagreb

The Rectorate of the University of Zagreb is located at Radoslava Cimermana 88, 10000 Zagreb, Croatia. The building is situated in the western part of the city, in a modern urban area with good public transport connections to the city centre and other important locations.

The University Rectorate can be easily reached by taxi, public transportation, or private car. From the city centre (Ban Jelačić Square), the trip takes around 20–30 minutes by car, depending on traffic. Visitors arriving from Franjo Tuđman International Airport can expect a 15–20-minute drive.

The Rectorate is located in a primarily residential and business district, with quick access to Zagreb's main traffic routes. While the immediate surroundings are more modern and functional rather than historical, the city centre with its cultural and historical landmarks – such as Ban Jelačić Square, the Upper Town (Gornji grad), the Croatian National Theatre, and numerous museums and galleries – is within easy reach.
